
I. The Missing Question

- A. What does history have to do with real life?
 - 1. The normal view of history is that it is "the study of the past." If that's all it is, and we live in the *present*, then what does history have to do with "real life"?
 - 2. The feeling people have about history not helping us with real life is captured by a great *Calvin and Hobbes* comic strip:









- 3. Traditional history focusses on a basic set of questions: who, what, where, and when.
- 4. Who—the Pilgrims, did what—landed, where—at Plymouth Rock, when—1620.
- 5. Many people believe that the meaning of history lies in the question: why?
- 6. Notice, however, that if we ask the question "Why did the Pilgrims land a Plymouth rock?" we are still only talking about the past.
- 7. We still don't have an answer to the question: what does this have to do with life in 2020?

B. WDISUATWWLI?

- 1. One version of the missing question that Calvin would like an answer to in the comic strip is: *WDISUATWWLI*?
- 2. "WDISUATWWLI" stands for What Does It Show Us About The World We Live In?
- 3. So the Pilgrims came to America in 1620. What does that show us about the world we live in?
- 4. Another way to think of it is: *What for? What*—is such knowledge—*for?* How can it help us to better understand the world?
- 5. If we learn history properly an event like the landing of the Pilgrims can be a part of a *revelation and explanation of the world we live in.* (As we will learn, America would not be the country that it is unless they had come!)
- 6. That is what we will be working towards in History At Our House. I hope that sounds good to you!
